#### Fish Report

We have a report that Chad Phillips caught and released a nice size bass recently in our lake. You are reminded that all bass caught

through Dec. 31, 2011 should be released immediately to allow them a chance to thrive and reproduce.

The Board of Directors is hopeful that the installation of six diffusers and one circulator, along with a few Christmas trees that were sunk at strategic spots in the lake to provide cover for the fingerlings, will help the small and large bass that were put into the lake in November to thrive and once again populate our lake. No trout lines are allowed in the lake. Brim, catfish, and sac-a-lait may be kept if caught.

#### Reminder:

"It is important to understand that owning a lot bordering on Oak Hills Lake in itself does not entitle the lot owner to the use of the lake. The Lake is a separate piece of property owned by the Oak Hills Lake Development Association. Owning a lakefront lot does entitle the lot owner to the right to become a member of the O.H.L.D.A. The only additional requirements for O.H.L.D.A. ..... are payment of the annual dues and obeying the By-Laws." (From a previous Board of Directors Letter) If you have not paid your dues for 2011 you may not fish or use the lake at all. Some non-paying lake residents have been observed fishing and using the lake. Please respect our rules.

## Birds on the Lake Canadian Geese

The Canadian Geese have multiplied on our lake. Our lake expert, Mark McElroy, has recommended that we don't feed the Canadians and to discourage their nesting and disrupt their nests. Canadian Geese return to the same wintering spots every year, so the young that are hatched this year will appear on our lake the next year and produce even more geese. They are considered a nuisance species. They are soiling our yards and lake and possibly increasing the nitrogen content in the

Black Swans - report from Brian Hanchey

The adult female swan (of the remaining 3) has built an enormous nest in the Hanchey's backyard and is sitting on a clutch of eggs. Hopefully, we may see several hatchlings within the next few weeks.

There have been several birds killed within the last two months by dogs, including one of the two juvenile black swans.

If you have a big dog, try to refrain from feeding the swans or creating an attractive area for them that might entice them onto property where they might be killed.

# Things you can do to help keep our lake beautiful

- \*\* Live Oaks are dropping their leaves in abundance! Please remove leaves from the gutters so they won't drain into the lake.
- \*\* Do not blow leaves into the lake.
- \*\* Edge and sod your servitude to keep sediment from entering the drains.
- \*\* Do not burn your limbs or leaves it is against the law and the smoke ruins our beautiful spring days!
- \*\* All the drains in Oak Hills drain into our lake
- make your neighbors aware of this.
- \*\* Try to limit the pesticides sprayed in your yard.

Notes from Hilltop's 2011 Garden Symposium – Lively Gardens: Flora and Fauna

The topics covered may be of interest to our neighbors in Oak Hills. Our own neighbor, Dr. Charles Fryling, and Dr. Neil Odenwald co-presented a talk about Attracting Birds to Southern Gardens.

Four elements are necessary to invite beautiful birds to your backyard according to Dr. Odenwald.

- **1. Food** This includes native plants, many that may be found at Hilltop ex. Beautyberry, night blooming jasmine, sweet pea, mimosa, native honeysuckle azalea, coral bean shrub, common fig, sunflowers, and elderberries, to name a few. Bird feeders and suet feeders which attract woodpeckers and hummingbird feeders will bring birds to your yard.
- **2.** Water Create an oasis for your birds. Use fresh water in your fountains, bird baths or even your lawn sprinkler. Sounds of water delight the birds and you too!
- **3. Habitat** Create diversity in your garden with tight spaces for protection. Vary heights of trees and bushes. Break up your yard with islands of planting. Bring plants out into your yard. Allow areas for taller grasses to grow. Remember a hierarchy of planting high, medium, and low plantings with edges along your yard.
- **4. Refuge** A place to watch birds and for your bird friends!

Dr. Fryling explained that 69 varieties of song birds visit and feed in the South. The ruby throated hummingbird, Eastern blue bird, Carolina wren, American goldfinch, red bellied and redheaded woodpeckers, cardinals, titmouse, chickadee, and 10-12 wintering species of hummingbirds are a few to watch for. Bird houses of differing heights and locations would welcome them.

He recommended many different plant materials to add to your yard specifically for bird attraction. Some of these are: box elder, American beech, service berry, devil's walking stick, paper mulberry, fringe tree, hollies, rough leaf dogwood, American sweet gum, sassafras, wahoo, black cherry, southern crab apples, pine trees, Chinese tallow tree, and iris. It is important to create coves for protection of birds.

Charlotte Seidenberg, author of <u>The Wildlife Garden: Planning Backyard Habitats</u> and <u>The New Orleans Garden: Gardening in the Gulf South</u>, recommended having a lot of native plants to attract butterflies and birds. Decaying wood and snags (dead trees) are important as well. Sunflowers, asters, and cone flowers are attractive to butterflies. The mint family with tropical sage and salvias are good. From the mustard family, sweet alyssum and pepper grass are a plus. A list of others are: fire spike, passionflower vine, milkweed, blue mist flower, red buckeye, wax myrtle, goldenrod, basket grass, black-eyed Susans, pokeweed, firecracker vine, pepper vine, blue edged grass, evening primrose, and butter bush.

We hope this taste of a great symposium will also excite you to invite and to keep our bird friends in Oak Hills.
